Luckily, Connecticut offers many programs to help with things like housing, job training, family crisis counseling, care for children and seniors and special support for young people – services that strengthen families and their communities. Now we have an even better way to help you help yourself.

Sometimes it's hard to know where to turn when you need a hand or good advice. Now there's a new – and better – way to find the help you need. HSI, short for Human Services Infrastructure, is helping people in Connecticut connect with services to improve their lives. Here's how.

# HSI Service Connection: We Work Together for You

Until now, you may have heard about programs from a variety of places:

- By calling 2-1-1 Infoline or
- Going to your local Community Action Agency or
- Through the State Department of Social Services (DSS)

While each place offers certain types of help, we can provide more complete service if we work together as a team so that you know about **all** the resources available to you and your family. For example, you may qualify for services you didn't even know existed. Our goal is to look at the **whole picture** and coordinate services to help you and your family make the most of available opportunities.

# How Does the HSI Service Connection Work?

Suppose you lost your job and your electricity was cut off because you couldn't pay your bill. Where would you go for help? You could start by calling Infoline at 2-1-1, which will refer you to a local Community Action Agency or Neighborhood Service Center. When you arrive at the agency, an agency staff member may ask not only about the electric bill, but about your job skills to see if you would qualify for a job-training program. The staff member might ask if you need childcare while you are in training, or refer you to programs that would offer temporary family assistance and food

stamps. The staff member might also suggest a service that could insulate your house or apartment to reduce those heating bills even after you're back on your feet. Or you may be interested in budget counseling, health or eviction prevention services. Your CAA staff member will work with you to find out how we can best help you!

# **Help with Paperwork**

If you are referred to programs provided by DSS, the Community Action Agency staff member will then help you organize the paperwork you need **before** your visit to DSS. The staff member will tell you **how** the programs work, **where** to go, **who** to talk to and **what** other information DSS will need for your application.

Remember, we can't help if we don't know what you need. It all starts with you! To make the HSI Service Connection call 2-1-1, or go to your local Community Action Agency or DSS office.

# **Services From Connecticut Community Action Agencies**

Community Action Agencies provide direct services. Some of the programs available are:

#### **Community and Neighborhood**

Neighborhood-based Service Centers that can connect you to services you need, including information and referral, emergency services such as food pantries and case management.

#### **Early Childhood**

Head Start, School Readiness, and Child Day Care Centers that prepare children for school. Other programs support families, such as helping fathers stay involved with their children.

#### **Elderly**

Meals on Wheels, Senior Community Cafes, Retired Seniors Volunteer Programs, Senior Companions/Foster Grandparents, adult day and Homemaker Services help seniors remain active and independent.

#### Nutrition

Nutrition services are provided for children, adults and the elderly through meal programs, food pantries, nutritional counseling sessions, and Women, Infants and Children (WIC) nutritional program.

#### **Energy & Weatherization Assistance**

Energy assistance, along with energy audit and weatherization services, can help insulate homes and reduce energy bills.

#### **Employment and Training**

One Stop Employment Center, vocational and technology skills training, G.E.D. and English as a Second Language programs, job search and job readiness services.

#### **Financial**

Individual Development Accounts, budgeting workshops, credit repair, and free help filing your income tax and claiming the earned income and child tax credits.

#### Housing

Homeless shelters and Eviction Prevention services are available. Supportive Housing programs and homeownership assistance services can assist you with housing concerns.

#### Youth and After School

A variety of youth programs include academic and cultural enrichment, life skills and independent living, and group homes.

#### Health

HIV/AIDS prevention and counseling, Substance Abuse prevention and treatment, transportation for health services, and health counseling services.

#### **Criminal Justice**

Alternative Incarceration Centers and halfway houses help individuals redirect their lives toward a path of success.
